

Hilton Elementary Parent and Family Engagement Policy/Plan and Procedures

Hilton Elementary is committed to the goal of providing quality education for every child in this district. To this end, we want to establish partnerships with parents and with the community. Everyone gains if Hilton Elementary and home work together to promote high achievement by our children. Neither home nor Hilton Elementary can do the job alone. Parents play an extremely important role as children's first teachers. Support for their children and for the school is critical to children's success at every step along the way.

Hilton Elementary recognizes that some students may need the extra assistance available through the Title I program to reach the state's high academic standards. Hilton Elementary intends to include parents in all aspects of the school's Title I program. The goal is a school-home partnership that will help all students to succeed.

-Title I review, curriculum and assessment overview is conducted the first Parent Association meeting of the year.


